

A Tempero XJ13 Replicar — by **Stew Jones**

This stunning XJ13 replicar first appeared at the Dream Show at Farmington Polo Club on August 25th. The next viewing was at Lime Rock's Historic 42 at Sunday in the Park, Sept 8, 2024, where it drew everyone's attention. (see photos) Stew tells how he was asked to take on this project of a very significant E-type which needed much work. Stew accepted the challenge. Thank you, Stew, for sharing this amazing story with us, and for your talent.

A client contacted me about a Tempero XJ13 replicar in April of 2018. It sounded like an interesting project and his request for a large displacement engine in an early block with a dry sump oil pan and system was all familiar to me so I accepted the project.

The Tempero XJ13 is a faithful replica of the 1966 Jaquar race car constructed for Le Mans. Jaguar produced a 5L quad cam 2 valve Hemi engine but when Ford arranged a change to a 7L displacement limit, this 5L engine and the XJ13 were no longer competitive.

This replicar was fabricated by Tempero Coach and Motor Co. Ltd of New Zealand and is car #7 of the 7 they produced between 1992 and 2006. Car #7 was never finished by Tempero as his company went bankrupt before completion.

The hand-formed aluminum monocoque faithfully replicated the only XJ13 now in the Jaguar Heritage Museum.

The Specs

The rear-mounted engine is now a 6.1L bore, 70mm stroke, single overhead cam Jaguar V12 with an origi-

nal style 5-speed ZF transaxle. The tuned length exhaust is more elaborate than the original and the intake replicates the look of the original while using the Jenvey electronic injection with a Motec management system.

Unlike the original, the rear suspension is derived from the E-Type.

This car was never finished by Tempero as it did not have any electrical, ignition, intake, fuel system, dry sump system, gauges or brake lines when it left Tempero.

The car subsequently went to Arizona where it was disassembled, and the engine and many custom fabricated parts were sold off or lost. All of the coachwork came with the car, along with the scratches and dents encountered in its unfortunate disassembly and transport.

The ZF transaxle arrived in 3 boxes with needle bearings and detent balls in a box with a hole in the bottom. Beyond supplying the engine and dry sump system, we reassembled the transaxle and suspensions. There were many lost custom fabricated Tempero parts that we engineered and fabricated as well as establishing

the systems originally missing from car #7.

The Tempero XJ13 is a beautiful and significant car, but as we made our way through the obstacles and challenges to its completion, we sometimes lost sight of its beauty.

Finally in August we assembled everything and took the Jaguar for its first drive ever! After its first test ride, we prepared it for showing at both the Farmington Dream Show on August 25th and the Lime Rock Historic 42 Sunday in the Park on September 1st. The XJ13 was received with much acclaim at both shows, rewarding us for all of our efforts.

We will perform a rear wheel dyno test as well as numerous test drives to fully sort out this creation before it is finished.

CLUB DUES ARE DUE SOONER THAN YOU THINK! (Dec 31st)

As most of you know, the Jaguar Club of Southern New England (JCSNE) is an affiliated club with Jaguar Clubs of North America (JCNA). All totaled, there are 58 different Jaguar Clubs throughout the USA, Canada and Mexico that come under the JCNA umbrella, of which our club is one. JCNA's main purpose is to provide a range of services to its members including liability insurance to cover club events, the bi-monthly *Jaguar Journal;* the establishment of rules and sanctions for Concours, slalom and rally events; and new members referrals to name a few.

Our Club, as well as the other 57 clubs, pay dues to JCNA. At present, JCNA is paid \$45 annually for each individual member, but on September 16, 2024, the JCNA Board increased the dues by \$10, resulting in a new JCNA fee of \$55 per individual member, paid to JCNA by the affiliated club.

Our club dues are presently annually and will increase to \$75 annually so as to maintain the \$20 margin left in order to manage our club and to continue the services that we perform. For members who opt for the printed and mailed copy of "The Spotted Cat" the additional cost for the newsletter will not change. Only the annual membership will increase by \$10.

The JCNA rationale is that its treasurer reported an estimated loss for 2024 of approximately \$30,000 and projected at least a similar, if not larger, loss for 2025. As it is the JCNA Board's duty and responsibility to set JCNA dues, the JCNA Board determined that the increase is necessary to prevent more loss that would reduce JCNA's reserves below a prudent reserve. It is not the JCNA Board's desire for this increase to place a burden upon the members or its affiliated clubs, and it is the JCNA Board's sincere hope that it will not.

As dues for 2025 are just around the corner, I wanted to provide this information to you to avoid any surprise.

Ratan Tata Chairman of Indian Conglomerate, dies at 86

NEW DELHI (AP) — Ratan Tata, died at a Mumbai hospital on Wednesday [10/9]. He was 86.

Tata Sons chairman N Chandrasekaran confirmed Tata's death and described him in a statement as his "friend, mentor and quide".

Prime Minister Narendra Modi described Tata as a visionary leader, and a compassionate and an extraordinary human being. Tata received the Padma Bhushan, one of India's most distinguished civilian awards, in 2000.

Tata Group is a sprawling collection of nearly 100 companies, including the country's largest automaker, and the largest private steel company. The companies employ more than 350,000 people worldwide. In June 2008, Tata bought Jaguar and Land Rover from Ford for \$2.3 billion.
